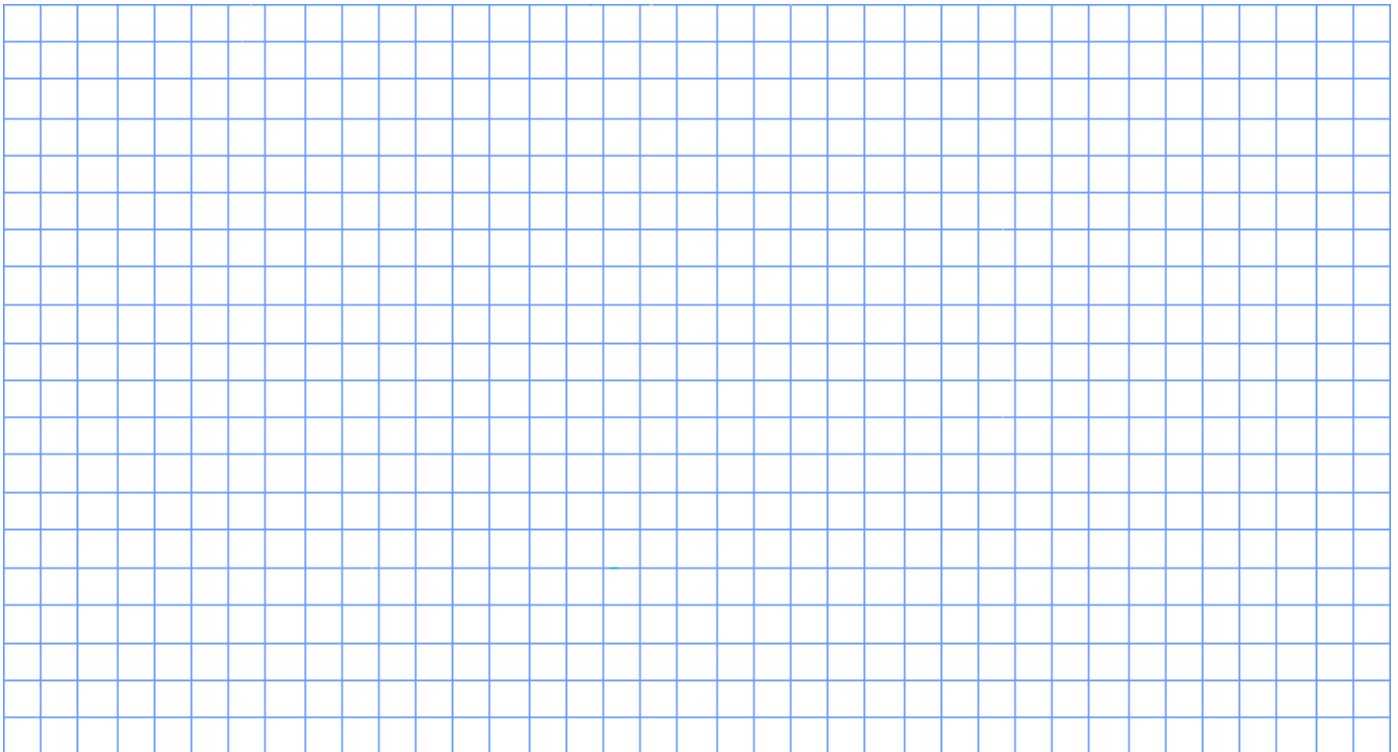
Explain to your counselor why a surveyor should be able to identify the poisonous plants and poisonous animals that are found in your area. _____

2. Find and mark the corners of a five-sided lot that has been laid out by your counselor to fit the land available. Set an instrument over each of the corners and record the angle turned between each line and the distance measured between each corner.

With the assistance of the counselor, compute the error of closure from the recorded notes. The error of closure must not be more than 5 feet.

From the corners, take compass readings or turn angles to trees, shrubs, and rocks, and measure to them. All measurements should be made using instruments, methods, and accuracies consistent with current technology. _____

3. From the field notes gathered for requirement 2, draw to scale a map of your survey. Submit a neatly drawn copy.
